# **F**rom the Pastor We Can Do Hard Things

In friendships, relationships, church, school, marriage, business, neighborhood... Sometimes we find ourselves at odds with another person. It happens.

While I teach skills for listening and speaking, even for "disagreeing better," mostly across the political divide, the skills actually come from marriage and family therapy. So they are really practical for everyday life.

I know how hard it is to actually work through uncomfortable situations. Just last week, dealing with a family situation, I had to listen, paraphrase, pause, pivot and ask for permission to share my side. It was hard, because I wanted to immediately jump in and defend myself, but the other person would not have felt respected or heard.

As I'm learning, I'm glad to share these things with you. In this newsletter, I'll give you an excerpt from the skills workshop. It's called "pivot."

Church is a good place to practice loving and forgiving, so that everyone can feel at home, and so that we can be better at being a light of peace and reconciliation to our neighbors. The more we learn and practice, the more we can do hard things and thrive.

# **T**ips for Navigating Difficult Conversations —"Pivot"

As people called by God to be peacemakers, we hosted a Braver Angels workshop October 15 called "How to Disagree Better." Some of the skills we practiced were:

- Pay attention, without thinking of how you're going to respond, listening for the other person's underlying values and concerns
- Paraphrase what you just heard
- Ask, "Is that right?" and wait for confirmation.
- Pause to see if they might be open to hearing your perspective.

The next one was new to some of us: PIVOT:

- A pivot signals that you are about to offer your own viewpoint.
- Examples: "Can I offer my thoughts on this?" "This is something I've thought a lot about."
- Look for a verbal "Okay, sure," or a nonverbal nod.
- When you pivot, you are not yet offering your perspective on the issue.
- Think of a pivot as signaling that you are going to make a turn in your car; the actual turn comes later.

- If the other person just repeats their point, ignoring your pivot, or shows wariness about you taking your turn (verbally or nonverbally), then consider backing up.

Then you can start sharing your perspective.

#### **Community Engagement**

- Our congregation provided a lunch for 50 teachers at French Prairie Middle School. Special thanks to Sam, Johanna, Vickie, Mark, Marci, and Rev. Cynthia, with fresh green beans from Andy's Community Garden.
- Rev. Cynthia taught "Skills for Disagreeing Better" workshops in October, fostering healthy dialogue in Aurora and Woodburn. Look for these valuable skills in this newsletter.
- In late October, Rev. Cynthia also chaired a national online debate, sharing her wisdom on crucial issues.

#### Upcoming Events

## Building and Grounds

- New Church Sign: We're thrilled to announce plans for a new church sign, budgeted at \$18,000 with a city grant covering half the cost.
- Kitchen Update: Approved upgrades include new flooring, a stainless steel counter, cooktop, and downdraft, all aimed at creating a more functional kitchen space. Installation is scheduled to complete by month's end.
- Nursery Flooring: We're considering options for the nursery flooring, with plans to clean the existing rubber mats.

## Financial Update

- Endowment Fund: Our endowment funds have grown, and updates are underway to consolidate accounts for smoother management.
- Mission Support: A motion passed to donate \$4,500 to Aware Food Bank for the remainder of 2024. We are committed to helping our community and will meet with Daisy at the Food Bank to discuss future support plans.
- Garden Project: The Community Garden is thriving! Andy reported a harvest of 1,182 pounds by the end of September, almost double last year's total.

## Outreach and Worship

- Meals on Wheels: Volunteers are needed for this vital community service.
- Love Inc. Auction: We'll be sponsoring a table at the November 2 auction, with proceeds supporting local charities.
- Christmas Eve Service: We'll host our Christmas Eve service at 4:00 PM. Join us in celebration, and help spread the word via social media and local outreach.
